FASTC AND FORT PICKETT

The Foreign Affairs Security Training Center (FASTC) will provide security training for Department of State (DOS) and other U.S. government staff posted at American embassies overseas; a small number of foreign security personnel will also be trained. The U.S. General Services Administration (GSA) and DOS officials began a conversation in 2010 with the Virginia Army National Guard's (VaARNG) Maneuver Training Center at Fort Pickett, Virginia (acting on behalf of the Commonwealth of Virginia) and representatives from Nottoway County regarding approximately 1,500 acres of land on and near Fort Pickett as a possible site for FASTC.

An initial feasibility study concluded that the proposed parcels at Fort Pickett can support FASTC. Additional analysis of the site is required. Environmental and land use planning studies will begin shortly on the potential site to determine the appropriateness as a possible site for FASTC. The site being analyzed includes two large parcels of land in Nottoway County, one held by VaARNG at Fort Pickett and one held by Nottoway County at Pickett Park. Both parcels would be needed to fit the FASTC program.

FASTC PROGRAM

Training will include small arms weapons training, driving courses, and classroom instruction. When fully operational, DOS expects to train approximately 8,000-10,000 students per year, with courses ranging from one week to several months long.

The Master Plan will include the following FASTC program functions:
